
# Read Aloud Books FOR PRESCHOOL 10 read aloud book suggestions with summaries



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


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"Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?" by Bill Martin Jr. and Eric Carle



This classic picture book features repetitive, rhythmic text that engages young readers. Each page introduces a new animal and its color, creating a predictable and enjoyable pattern. ### "Goodnight Moon" by Margaret Wise Brown and Clement Hurd



A timeless bedtime story, "Goodnight Moon" features a little bunny saying goodnight to everything in his room and the world outside. The gentle, rhythmic text and soothing illustrations create a calm and peaceful atmosphere, perfect for bedtime reading. The repetitive structure helps children settle down and prepare for sleep.

# "Chicka Chicka Boom Boom" by Bill Martin Jr. and John Archambault, illustrated by Lois Ehlert



In this lively alphabet book, the letters of the alphabet race each other up a coconut tree, but soon the tree becomes top-heavy, and the letters tumble down. The rhythmic, rhyming text and bright, bold illustrations make learning the alphabet fun and memorable. It's perfect for read-aloud sessions and helps with letter recognition and phonemic awareness.




### "Llama Llama Red Pajama" by Anna Dewdney





The story reassures children that their parents are always nearby, even if they can't see them. It's a perfect bedtime read that addresses separation anxiety and the comfort of parental love.

### "Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes" by James Dean and Eric Litwin





### "Giraffes Can't Dance" by Giles Andreae

Each new request leads to another as the mouse needs a glass of milk, a straw, a napkin, and so on, eventually circling back to wanting another cookie. The story's playful, repetitive structure highlights the whimsical consequences of a simple act of kindness.
