




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## Introduction

Insects are a fascinating part of the natural world—tiny creatures with big jobs! This Insects Preschool Circle Time Plan is designed to spark curiosity and wonder as young learners explore the amazing lives of bugs through engaging, hands-on experiences. Throughout the week, children will discover what makes an insect an insect, where they live, how they move, what they eat, and the important ways they help our world.

Through interactive discussions, playful songs, movement games, and creative activities, children will pretend to march like ants, fly like bees, and shine like fireflies. They'll sort bugs, act out insect behaviors, feed pretend insects, and even become pollinators in a fun relay game. Each day includes a thoughtful read-aloud, sensory exploration, and opportunities to build empathy for the tiny creatures that share our gardens and playgrounds.

Whether children are already bug lovers or just meeting insects for the first time, this plan will inspire discovery, laughter, and learning—all while laying the foundation for science and nature appreciation. Get ready for a week full of wiggles, wings, and wonder!

#### What's Included:

#### 1. Detailed Circle Time plans

Each day of the week is planned with a structured circle time agenda that includes:

- Introduction: A brief and captivating introduction to the daily theme, setting the stage for the day's activities.
- Song: A fun and educational song related to the daily theme, designed to engage children and reinforce learning through music and movement.
- Read aloud and discussion: A carefully selected picture book paired with thoughtprovoking discussion questions to enhance comprehension and encourage interaction.
- Activities: Creative and hands-on activities that complement the day's theme, fostering
  gross and fine motor skills, creativity, and critical thinking.

#### 2. Posters and props

Day 1	What Are Insects?  Children will learn the characteristics that make an insect an insect.	Book: "Bugs Are Insects" by Anne Rockwell  Discussion: What makes an insect an insect? Identifying body parts and characteristics that all insects share.	Insect Sorting Children sort images into "Insects" and "Not Insects" Materials: Pictures of animals and insects, headers labeled "Insects" and "Not Insects."
Day 2	How Do Insects Move?  Children will explore how different insects move (crawl, fly, hop, wiggle).	Book: "Some Bugs" by Angela DiTerlizzi  Discussion: How different insects move — crawling, flying, jumping, and wiggling.	Move Like an Insect Children move like different insects by acting out how they crawl, fly, hop, or wiggle based on picture prompts. Materials: Open space, insect picture cards.
Day 3	Where Do Insects Live?  Children will discover different insect habitats and why insects live in certain places.	Book: "A Good Place" by Lucy Cousins  Discussion: Where insects live and why they need the right habitat to survive.	Insect Habitat Sorting Children match insect pictures to their correct habitats and discuss why each insect lives there.  Materials: Insect images, habitat pictures.
Day 4	What Do Insects Eat?  Children will learn about what different insects eat and how they find their food.	Book: "In the Tall, Tall Grass" by Denise Fleming  Discussion: What insects eat and how they find their food.	Feed the Insect Game Children match food cards to insects based on what they eat and count out how much food to "feed" them. Materials: Printable insect faces with mouths, food cards with quantity instructions.
Day 5	How Do Insects Help Us?  Children will understand the importance of insects in nature.	Book: "I love Insects" by Lizzy Rockwell  Discussion: Why insects are important and how they help plants, animals, and people.	Pollination Relay Children act like bees, transferring "pollen" between flower cups to learn how insects help plants grow. Materials: Cotton balls (pollen), cups with flower pictures.

#### Day 1: What Are Insects?

Children will learn the characteristics that make an insect an insect.

#### Introduction

Ask the children, "What is a bug?" Let them share their ideas. Then ask, "Do you think all bugs are insects?" Explain that some bugs are insects, but not all bugs are. Guide the discussion toward understanding that insects have six legs, three body parts (head, thorax, abdomen), and many have wings and antennae. Show pictures of different small creatures like ants, butterflies, ladybugs, spiders, worms, and bees and ask, "Which ones do you think are insects?" Discuss how insects are different from other bugs like spiders and worms.

#### Song

"Overin the Garden" (Tune: "Overin the Meadow")

**Prop:** Insect number props

**Action:** Encourage children to sing along and act out each insect's movement. Have them flap their arms to buzz like bees, pinch their fingers to chomp like ladybugs, crouch and jump like crickets, march in place like ants, and twinkle their fingers to shine like fireflies.

#### **Read Aloud & Discussion**

**Book:** "Bugs Are Insects" by Anne Rockwell

**Before Reading:** "Have you ever seen a bug outside? Some bugs are insects, but others are not! Let's read and find out what makes an insect special."

**After Reading:** "What did we learn about insects? What are the three main body parts? Do all insects have wings? Can you name an insect you have seen before?"






#### **Activity**

#### **Insect Sorting**

**Materials:** Pictures of different animals and insects, headers labeled "Insects" and "Not Insects."

**Activity:** Show the children a picture of an animal or insect. Ask them to decide whether it belongs in the "Insects" category or "Not Insects" category. Discuss why each creature belongs in its category (e.g., "Does it have six legs?" "Does it have three body parts?").

**Extension:** Take the children outside to look for real insects. Have them describe what they see and decide if it is an insect or not.














## Over in the Garden







## Ladybug


Ladybugs are small, round insects with bright red or orange shells and black spots. They are helpful bugs because they eat tiny plant-eating insects like aphids. Ladybugs have six legs, antennae, and wings under their hard shells. They crawl on leaves and flowers and sometimes fly from plant to plant. Ladybugs like warm, sunny weather and are often found in gardens.

Print, laminate and cut out. If using on a felt board, attach velcro to the back of each piece. If using on a white board, attach magnetic strips to the back of each piece.






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


